CONFEDERATE MEDAL OF HONOR CITATION

David Herbert Llewellyn, M.D. Surgeon, *CSS Alabama*, C.S.N. Engagement with *USS Kearsarge* off the coast of Cherbourg, France

19 June 1864

"With the battle lost and the *Alabama* going down, Dr. Llewellyn, upon hearing the order to abandon ship, patiently assisted the wounded into a crowded lifeboat. Despite the entreaties of those he had helped, Dr. Llewellyn remained aboard the *Alabama*, refusing to board the lifeboat for fear of capsizing the already dangerously crowded vessel. When the great ship disappeared beneath the waves, Dr. Llewellyn was last seen alive jumping into the turbulent open sea, never once having mentioned that he could not swim." INTERESTING FACTS ABOUT SLAVERY

- ♦ The medical care received by most slaves was superior to that of the Southern whites.
- ♦ By state law slaves were not permitted to learn to read or write, but due to their own initiative, often aided by their slave owner, many did so.
- ♦ Period data suggests that, at least from a financial sense, free Africans were better off in the South versus the North.
- ♦ Thousands of free Africans in the South owned their own slaves.
- ♦ There were nearly half a million free blacks in the United States at the outbreak of the War Between the States, and the majority of them lived in the South.
- ♦ The vast majority of slave owners lived on small farms. The large plantations were a myth; only fifteen people in the entire South owned five hundred or more slaves.
