BGen E. Porter Alexander Camp's annual Lee-Jackson Banquet was held Saturday January 17th, 2009 at Burns Memorial United Methodist Church in Augusta.

Commander Nick Posey welcomed attendees and thanked them for attending in honor of Generals Robert E. Lee and Thomas Jonathan "Stonewall" Jackson. Chaplain Mike Milford gave the invocation and blessing, and the pledges were recited. After the reading of the SCV Charge, the Honor Guard presented the colors. After the meal, special guests were introduced.

Program speaker, Mrs. Virginia Morton from Culpeper, Virginia, gave a very interesting and entertaining presentation on the battles and activities that took place in Culpeper County Virginia during the War Between the States. She wrote an historical novel, "Marching Through Culpeper," based on events during the war in Culpeper. After her slide presentation Mrs. Morton sold copies of her recently published book.

Commander Posey presented his annual Commander's Award, which is awarded to one member who had served the camp above and beyond the call of duty during the previous year. The award was presented to Philip Edwin Weaver for his exemplary service to the camp during the past year, and also for his many contributions since becoming a member of Camp #158.

Camp Gains Two New Members

Commander Nick Posey called the meeting to order and welcomed camp members and guests. Chaplain Michael Milford gave the invocation. The pledges were recited by all present, the SCV Charge read and special guests and first time visitors were introduced.

Commander Posey presented a resolution, sent from SCV General Headquarters, to Mrs. Carole Camak in memory of her husband and longtime Camp #158 member, Mr. James X. Camak, who passed away on October 6th, 2008.

Our program speaker, Dr. Marshall Waters from Washington, Georgia, gave a PowerPoint presentation and discussed "The Midnight Raid at Chennault, Georgia," which occurred on May 24th, 1865. This was a follow up to the talk he gave last October about the missing Confederate treasury gold that, as legend has it, disappeared in the vicinity of Washington, Georgia. Dr. Waters' well researched discussion dispelled most of the myths surrounding the ongoing controversy about what actually happened to the lost gold.

Two applications for membership were presented to the camp. Applications received from Mark Rogers of Hephzibah and David Armour of Washington were voted on and unanimously accepted. Mark Rogers joined through his 3rd great grandfather, Private Charles Clayton Phillips, who served in Company E, 14th Regiment of the SC Infantry. David Armour joined under his great-great grandfather, Private Willis D. Armour, who served in Company G, 61st Georgia Infantry.

Black Confederate History: The Brave Substitute

—Among the incidents of the battles near Richmond, the Dispatch relates the following: In this place we may mention an amusing scene that occurred of late near the Mechanicsville road. The 8th and 9th Georgia were ordered out to repel the enemy, when, upon the men falling in one of the 9th stepped from the ranks and told the captain "he wasn't able to face the music." "You are scared," said the captain; "lay down your gun and accoutrements, and retire sir." The chicken-hearted gentleman did so, when shortly afterwards there stepped forward a good looking darkey, named Wesley, well known in camp, who asked permission to put on the deserted accoutrements and shoulder his gun. The request being granted, Wesley followed the company into action, and though the shells and minie balls of the enemy were falling thick and fast about him, Wesley never wavered, but brought down a Yankee at every fire. Such a deed is worthy of remembrance, and should inspire our soldiery with tenfold energy and courage...
