Georgia Division SCV to Commemorate Lee's Birthday and Georgia's Secession on January 21st

To begin its observance of the sesquicentennial of the War Between the States, the Georgia Division is sponsoring a unique event to commemorate the birthday of Gen. Robert E. Lee and the secession of the state of Georgia from the Union on Saturday, January 22nd at the old Capitol in Milledgeville.

As January 19th is Lee's birthday and the date Georgia proclaimed itself a republic, the Georgia Division is planning a reenactment of the speeches by five of the main speakers at the 1861 Convention in the Legislative Chambers: Alexander Stephens, Robert Toombs, Thomas Cobb, Eugenius Nisbett, and Hershel Johnson and will focus on the issues each representative brought to the debate. The performance will last 30-40 minutes and will end with a very dramatic conclusion.

As in previous years, there will be a march to the old Capitol from the old Governor's Mansion at 10:45 AM. Participants will assemble at the old Governor's Mansion at the corner of West Hancock Street and Clark Street between 10 and 10:40 AM. All compatriots, including those in wheelchairs, are invited to participate and period uniforms and flags are encouraged.

During the elections for Camp officers, Ron Udell was elected Commander, Lee Herron was elected as 1st Lt. Commander and Daniel Martin was elected as 2nd Lt. Commander. Dr. John Baxley was elected as camp surgeon and David Powell as Judge Advocate. All other officers retained their current positions.

The meeting was adjourned by Commander Herron. After the benediction, the camp sang *Dixie*.

Column in British Newspaper Slanders SCV and Maligns Lee


In the December 27th edition of the British newspaper, *The Guardian*, reprobate Texan Barrett Brown, in an article entitled "Neo-Confederate Civil

War Revisionism" slanders the Sons of Confederate Veterans and makes the ridiculous claim that its members made death threats against the Confederate heritage hater, "Professor" Jonathan Farley, in 2002, whose columns have called for the eradication of all Confederate monuments. Having been a member of the SCV for almost 25 years and been involved with numerous camps, this editor knows of no compatriot who would even suggest such despite Farley's intolerance.
