Georgia Division SCV Announces "Flags Across Georgia" Campaign

Following up the redesign of their specialty license plate in Georgia which now prominently features the Confederate battle flag, the Georgia Division of the Sons of Confederate Veterans announced today the launch of a bold "Flags Across Georgia" campaign which will raise Confederate battle flags and 1956 Georgia flags in prominent places throughout the state of Georgia as part of the ongoing effort to commemorate the sesquicentennial of the War and to promote Southern Heritage.

A 60 foot flagpole flying a 180 square foot Confederate battle flag on US Highway 19 in south Georgia's Mitchell County is the newest addition to a rapidly growing number of highly visible flags being erected by the SCV all over Georgia. More than a dozen huge flagpoles have quietly gone up awaiting the announcement of the beginning of the "Flags Across Georgia" campaign. These flags include 50 foot flag poles in both Augusta and Ringgold, both on major highways in heavily commercialized areas. The pole in Augusta is located on Wheeler Road, a busy four lane highway just off I-20. The flagpole in Ringgold is located on Battlefield Parkway at I-75 exit 350. Each of the poles is located in a highly visible location and flies a large 10 x 15 foot battle flag which is visible for miles around to those travelling Georgia's roads and interstates.

The largest flag erected so far is a Confederate battle flag just northof Tifton, Georgia right beside I-75. The huge flag is 30' x 50' atop a pole that stands a towering 120' above the landscape and has attracted a huge amount of attention, especially since it is positioned on the main route travelled by millions of tourists heading to and from Florida from all over America.

The sites selected for the existing flagpoles in the "Flags Across Georgia" campaign include parcels of land which have been sold, deeded, leased, and loaned to the SCV by the original owners. A list of land owners offering their properties as potential sites for additional flagpoles in prominent locations has been growing as word of the bold new campaign has leaked out around the state in recent weeks.

As part of the "Flags Across Georgia" campaign, homeowners around the state are also being encouraged to fly the Confederate flag and 1956 Georgia Memorial Flag bearing the St. Andrews Cross on smaller flagpoles at their homes and in their communities as a demonstration of their love for Southern Heritage and to commemorate the War during its 150th anniversary.

The "Stars and Bars" - or First National flag of the Confederacy - after which Georgia Rep. Bobby Franklin designed Georgia's current state flag is not the Confederate battle flag which bears the more recognizable "St. Andrew's

Cross," despite mistakes by some in the media confusing the two.

The St. Andrews Cross of the battle flag is a Christian symbol which has historically stood for freedom from tyranny and oppression dating back nearly a thousand years to its origins during Scotland's wars for independence.

While the raising of the flags in the "Flags Across Georgia" campaign is a part of the sesquicentennial commemoration of the War, the SCV plans on continuing the project after the commemoration draws to an end in 2015 according to Georgia Division officers.



California Bill Would Prohibit Sale of Confederate Flags on State Property

In an effort to deter freedom of choice and historical learning, an historically ignorant California

legislator has introduced a bill in the California House that would ban the sale of Confederate flags on California state property.

Isadore Hall, an African-American assemblyman from Compton, states Confederate flag memorabilia is being sold at the Capitol gift shop and was on sale during last summer's state fair on the Cal Expo Fairgrounds. The issue came to his attention after his mother saw replica Confederate money on sale in the Capitol gift shop

The ban would apply only to property owned by the state.

Sherman Selected as Museum of the Confederacy's "Person of the Year"

In a move that angered many Confederate heritage advocates, attendees at The Museum of the Confederacy's Speakers' Symposium, which was held on February 22nd at the Library of Virginia, voted Union General William T. Sherman as their "Person of the Year" for the year 1864.

History professor John Marszalek of Mississippi State University stated Sherman changed the way wars were fought (by terrorizing civilians and burning homes) and was most responsible for the outcome of the War. Sherman received 38 votes compared to Gen. Patrick Cleburne who garnered 29 votes. Third place went to the Union President, Abraham Lincoln.

The vote, according to many Confederate heritage advocates, was reflective of the changes affecting the Museum of the Confederacy which recently combined with the historical revisionist American Civil War Center--a move that the SCV feared last year. The Center, located on the site of the Confederacy's Tredegar Iron Works, is known for its controversial statue of Lincoln. The new museum will be known as "The American Civil War Museum" with a subtitle of "Confederacy, Union, Freedom".

Many compatriots believe the Museum of the Confederacy's actions constitute a betrayal of the donors' trust in that priceless artifacts were donated to the Museum with the understanding that the items would be interpreted from a Confederate or Southern perspective.

The unit, enduring an unusually cold night of sleet and freezing rain, was surprised by Union troops and its Colonel barely escaped. Captured by 2nd Sgt. William Ayers of the 35th Iowa Volunteers, the flag was auctioned in Oregon to the highest bidder in 2010.
