YANKEE PRISONS

Camp Douglas, Chicago, IL

Originally a training camp for Illinois troops. the



first Confederate prisoners arrived in 1862—about 8,000 from the capture of Fort Donelson. During the War. Camp Douglas would hold more 18,000 than prisoners—12,000 in Dec., 1864.

Within one year following the opening of the prison camp, the mortality rate was at 10 percent. One in five prisoners would die during the camp's history as a prisoner of war camp—a death rate unsurpassed by any other prison, Union or Confederate (note: the death rate at Camp Sumpter (Andersonville) was nine percent. In the aftermath of the war, Camp Douglas eventually came to be noted for its estimated death rate of about seventeen percent, although it is possible a higher rate occurred.

Poorly clothed and sick, the first prisoners only had one surgeon to care for them as disease, hunger, poor sanitation, and cold weather began to take their toll on the Confederate prisoners. Prisoners were deprived of clothing to discourage escapes. Many wore sacks with head and arm holes cut out, few had underwear. Blankets to offset the bitter northern winter were confiscated from the few who had them.

Between 4,000 and 6,000 Confederate prisoners perished at Camp Douglas and were buried in a single mass-grave, known as "Confederate Mound at Oak Woods Cemetery." Surrounded by cannon and cannonballs, a lone 46-foot monument was erected in 1895. It is the largest mass-grave in the Western hemisphere, filled with the bodies of Confederate dead, 4,200 known and 1,800 unknowns.

Among the many soldiers buried there is **Private Berry Black**, a black Confederate cavalryman, captured with General Morgan's Raiders. Other famous Confederate prisoners included **Sam Houston**, **Jr.** and **Henry M. Stanley**, famed African explorer known for his statement, "Dr. Livingstone, I presume."

A monument erected by Confederate veterans is all that remains of Camp Douglas. Now located at Oak Woods Cemetery, the monument is surrounded by an unknown number of Confederate soldiers in a mass-grave—records at Camp Douglas either having been lost or misplaced.

KNOW OUR CAMP OFFICERS:

Camp Commander Elect

As per the SCV Camp Manual: "The Commander has a unique responsibility to lead, encourage, assist, guide, maintain esprit-de-corps, and above all, to work to achieve harmony within the Camp. The Commander does have the overall responsibility for the Camp he has been elected to serve. The Commander presides at all meetings or otherwise designates his subordinate officers to do so. He will appoint all non-elected officers and all necessary committees and will perform such other duties as are usually incident to the office. He will fill all vacated offices occurring during his administration until the next election of officers, with the advice and consent of the Camp executive council."

J. J. Brittingham comes to the SCV through his Confederate ancestor **Pvt. William Mulherin** of the Co. C, 2nd Battalion, Georgia Sharpshooters. JJ and his bride **Noel** were married in 1984, they have 3 children; John, Brian, and Emily, and 5 Grandchildren.

JJ is a graduate of Aquinas HS, and earned a BA Degree in Business Administration, at Augusta College in 1973. He is Currently retired as a Construction Estimator, JJ has been a pipefitter, a Home Builder, a Project Manager, and a Project Controls Engineer

He is a member of St. Mary on the Hill Catholic Church and the Knights of Columbus Patrick Walsh Council. His other interests include Atlanta Falcons, Ga Tech, Atlanta Braves, playing golf, Military history, Classic Cars, and Saltwater Fishing.

In JJ's own words, "I was born on Confederate Memorial Day, mother said that very few people were at the hospital, they were all downtown at the parade. My work history has taken me around the country to include Vicksburg, Denver, Washington State, Pensacola, northern Virginia, Atlanta, and Guatemala. I had the privilege to visit all of the major National Battlefields of the War of Northern Aggression. My mother sewed me an exact replica of Robert E. Lee's uniform jacket for Christmas when I was 4 years old. She said I wore it every day for months until it got too hot to wear it."

WALTER WILLIAMS—Rest In Peace



This past December, the Nation, and the South lost a generous, thoughtful, and conservative friend.

Williams was a Distinguished Professor of Economics at George Mason University, as well as a syndicated columnist and author. Known for his classical liberal and libertarian views, Williams's writings frequently ap-

peared in Townhall, WND, and Jewish World Review.

As an economist, Williams was a proponent of free market economics and opposed socialist systems of government intervention. Williams believed *laissez-faire* capitalism to be the most moral, most productive system humans have ever devised

Williams viewed gun control laws as a governmental infringement upon the rights of individuals, and argued that they end up endangering the innocent while failing to reduce crime.

Williams praised the views of Thomas DiLorenzo, and wrote a foreword to DiLorenzo's anti-Abraham Lincoln book, *The Real Lincoln*. Williams maintained that the American states are entitled to secede from the union if they wish, as the Confederate states attempted to do during the War Between the States and asserted that the Union's victory in the War allowed the federal government "to run amok over states' rights, so much so that the protections of the Ninth and Tenth Amendments mean little or nothing today.

A few Williams Quotes:

- 1. Government is about coercion. Limiting government is the single most important instrument for guaranteeing liberty.
- 2. Democracy is little more than mob rule, while liberty refers to the sovereignty of the individual.
- 3. The true test of one's commitment to liberty and private property rights...comes when we permit people to be free to do those voluntary things with which we disagree.


THE CONFEDERATE LEGION

SAVE the MONUMENT

Update: Save the Monuments in Augusta, Inc. has a new Post Office Box. Our mailing address is: P.O. Box 16542, Augusta, GA, 30909. We have a PayPal account up and running on our group page and website:

We have had a busy month preparing for the inevitable battle to save the monument. We have met with Randy Sheppard, Attorney at Law, who will be our local attorney and we are consulting with Martin K. O'Toole [GA Division, SCV] with regard to [our] next steps. We currently have the names of four attorneys who are familiar with the litigations going on in GA regarding the illegal monument removals, and will be enlisting one of them to help us and to work with Randy Sheppard as the trial attorney.

At this time, we continue to gather all legal filings in the cases involving Covington, Macon, Gwinnett Co., Dekalb, McDonough, as well as watching the threats in Brunswick and Savannah. Attorneys for the cities of Brunswick and Savannah have advised the Commissioners that they are opening themselves up to individual [personal] lawsuits if they move forward with monument removals.
